Learn to Turn

Shop Tip – Paul Snyder

This is primarily for pen turners, but can apply to all turners. As you know the various pens require drilling a specific size hole for each pen type. I became curious about the requirement to have a 5/16 bit, an 8 mm bit, and a 'O' bit since they seemed alike. I took my caliper and measured each bit and was amazed that they are all, yup, you guessed it: 5/16ths. Try it....you'll like it.

Shop Safety Tip – Paul Snyder

While turning a 9 inch bowl that had a minor and apparently insignificant flaw I had an incident occur that should be a warning to all turners.

The bowl was shaped and the tail stock was in place for support. While hollowing out the bowl I left the tail stock in place. It was on an extension for convenience. All went well and things were looking good with no apparent weakness or flaws visible. I moved the tail stock back some so I could remove the column of wood remaining in the bowl center. I had just started to complete the bottom of the bowl when, with a big BANG, the lathe started to walk around, the revolving center moved from the tail stock into the bowl with the back end of the extension still barely supported in the tail stock quill and was whipping around inside the remainder of the bowl. It was obvious that a big section of bowl had separated. The lathe switch was on the other side of the activity and I had no choice but get in line with the rotation to shut it off. When I did I was just waiting to become speared by the revolving center whipping around in the bowl!

The moral of this and a safety solution is to plug in your lathe on the side you will be working from (the tail stock side), if possible, so you can reach over and unplug the lathe in an emergency. Mark the outlet with a red marker or some other way so it is not forgotten where the lathe is plugged in and is easily located to disconnect.

What appears to have happened is that removing the center column of good wood uncovered a hidden flaw in the wood that was weak and the minor discoloration I noticed was really bad wood following a grain line. That is where the separation occurred.

The event happened so fast that it's difficult to reconstruct the chain of events. The speed and force of this incident resulted in my tool rest lying on the floor broken from the post and the bowl had about one third of the side broken out. I felt nothing through the tool handle and didn't get hurt but could have.

I'm writing in regard to the article "Spotlight on Boxelder" in the Aug/Sept 2013 issue of Woodcraft Magazine. I'm a professor of wood anatomy at Oregon State University and have been researching spalting for ten years. I was dismayed to find the article perpetuated the myth of the "spalting" of boxelder. Morse and Blanchette thoroughly debunked this myth in 2002 ("Etiology of Red Stain in Boxelder" in Plant Health Progress). The characteristic red/pink stain in boxelder is caused by the tree as a response to wounding or stress, not a

specific fungus. Many trees make pigments under similar circumstances. One of the easiest ways to tell if a pigment on wood is caused by the tree or the fungus is to note its colorfastness. As noted in your article, the red stain in boxelder fades in light. A spalting fungus would generally be light-stable. —Dr. Sara C. Robinson, Corvallis, Oregon

Here's to you, Ms. Robinson, for setting the record straight on the boxelder stain.
