A very special thanks to Dirk!






Sam Sampedro – Jan 6th

During this demo, Sam used Dr. Loyd Taylor's 'Through the Magic of Television' to accomplish the demo. Thanks Dr. Taylor.

Sam discussed viewing a YouTube video by Mike Waldt from the UK and found an off center bowl interesting. He purchased an exotic piece of 2x6 and glued it into a bowl blank and experimented turning the off center bowl shown below.



Using a piece of birch plywood, he made a waste block which has a center for the basic bowl and then moved the center 3/4" and established the off center for the face plate. It is shown in the following picture.



The center mark (red circle) is mounted on the underside of the bowl using the glue of your choice (he used Titebond II) to mount it and turn the outside of the bowl. Then remounted the faceplate (blue circle) to turn the off center part of the bowl.



The finished demo bowl is noted below.



Subsequent to the demo, Sam turned another bowl using a ½" offset which provided a better ratio of thick to thin on top of the finished bowl.

2015 Segmenting Workshop

Shop Tip – Chuck Kuether

What Would Tom (Krajacich) Do?

So I'm turning this 18" long X 10" diameter "apple scratter" for a relative who is making some cider and well some hard cider. I need a 1/2" hole all the way through the middle and I need to remove the tendon so I can chuck this piece when I am drilling the holes on the lathe.



I used Tom's method of using a collet with the steel rod and pin. See below.

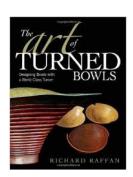

Woodturning by Bonnie Klein

Bonnie Klein is one of the pioneers of the woodturning industries, revolutionizing small-scale turning and producing many fine pieces.

In 1989, when I attended my first woodturning symposium, Bonnie was one of the lead demonstrators. I was totally mesmerized by her skill at woodturning, her ability as a demonstrator and her enthusiastic, positive personality. Hard to imagine, but she's gotten even better!


Last year, I saw Bonnie's presentation on how she prepares animal bone for use in her woodturning. The small boxes and jewelry made from this bone look like ivory! To say the least, she likes to experiment with turning unusual materials.



Klein specializes in small sized turning projects, like this increasingly small series of nested boxes, each more intricately cut.

Bonnie is known in the turning world for having pioneered the field of small-scale turning. She developed the Klein lathe in 1986, then followed that with the Klein threading jig in 1992. She has written a book and produced many videos.

It's an understatement to say that Bonnie loves the creative process. In her words, she is "addicted to discovery, progress and the fact that perfection is forever elusive, but as I strive for it, yesterday's challenges become the basic skills of tomorrow."



Each nested boxwood box has a corresponding cover, along with a surprise in the form of a spinning top.

Bonnie's nested boxes are made from boxwood, coveted for its superior turning properties, as well as its lovely color and texture. It's not enough that the boxes all have lids: each lid is threaded and screws to its corresponding base. Lined up, they show Bonnie's skill in tool control and her eye for detail. The surprise inside is a miniature top. It spins, perfectly.

Bonnie volunteers a lot of her time teaching youngsters how to turn. She travels with 10 lathes, tools and wood in the back of her van to teach classes. At the American Association of Woodturners' annual symposium, Bonnie heads up a program where a bank of lathes is set up, and each child has a volunteer mentor to assist. They make a preplanned project and take it with them when finished.

Bonnie's advice: it's more important for the tools to be in proportion to your work piece than to the lathe. Higher RPMs will produce smoother surfaces right off the tools, provided they are used correctly.

Woodturning Options for Creating Pen Blanks and Where to Get Them

Pen blanks can be made from just about anything, from scrap bin wood to deer antlers to interesting woods you find in stores or online.

Pen blanks can be made from just about anything you can turn ... from antlers to synthetics to wood salvaged from your favorite tree. Once you start turning pens, you'll probably find suitable pen blanks every place you look. Since the blanks are so small, they're good projects for using the tiny scraps you can't bear to throw out. I collect those small-but-precious scraps in a bin in my shop. Once I've accumulated a pile, I cut them to pen size (3/4" x 3/4" x 6" works well).

If you want to take a shortcut, you can purchase pen blanks from a variety of places. I've also picked up some great blanks on eBay. Pre-cut blanks are a nice convenience for getting pens turned in a hurry, and they are also a good way to get cool materials you wouldn't otherwise use for woodworking. They can cost as little as 50 cents each or as much as \$25 for really exotic blanks such as prairie rattlesnake. Some pre-cut blanks even come drilled and already round. However, here's a word to the wise: Be careful when trying a new tropical hardwood for the first time. Some species can cause allergic reactions, especially members of the rosewood family. Always wear a dust respirator, safety glasses or a face shield and long sleeves to protect yourself from the dust you create during the sanding stage.
