Just in case you are getting bored and need to watch some real talent from here in Montana. Dave Manix told me about this You Tube site EngelsCoachShop from Joliet, Montana. In their videos they show a wagon builder who does wood working, turning, metal work, etc. What talent this gentleman has. For wood turning, his video from September 7, 2018 on "Turning Spanish Cannon Hubs/Wood Lathe/Wheelwright shop" is guite good and shows his large precise wood turning. It may also get you hooked on watching his work. His craftsmanship is terrific. Hope this might help you pass the quarantine time, and Thank Dave Manix for the "heads-up."

And from Camille Good: American Woodturner, April 2020, Vol 35 No 2.

Pg 14, in "Book Reviews" David Heim reviews the new third edition of *The Lathe Book* by Conover, from Taunton Press. It is not just a book about lathes and various lathe features, but also tools to be used in conjunction with a lathe, and other shop necessities such as faceshields, dust collection options, and sharpening jigs.

Page 18, in "Three-Faceted Bowl Gouge Handle" David Ellsworth covers how to make a more ergonomic bowl gouge handle that has three rounded facets. The out-of-round shape helps decrease the tendency to grip the handles too tightly, which in turn reduces hand fatigue and possibly injury. It uses some of the multi-axis turning techniques that were demonstrated in our club a while back.

Page 24, in "Turn a Wood Hat" JoHannes Michelsen describes how to make a wooden hat. It's a pretty detailed and precise process. But the author does a nice job of turning adversity into advantage, by using the warping that can occur as wood dries to make a turned round hat into a dried oval hat. He also uses the malleability of wet wood to create a curved brim on his hats as they dry. On pages 34-37 there's an impressive gallery of wooden hats made by Michelsen and other turners.

Page 38, in "What's in a Name" Terry Martin writes about the early history of the AAW and about woodturning as a profession, along with some of the philosophical debates that are still ongoing. I mention it because it might be interesting for the following people:

- Anyone interested in the early history of the AAW, or in the history of woodturning as a profession that once was very essential but focused on the utilitarian,
- Anyone who is interested in the philosophical debate of what is craft versus what is art,
- Anyone who is trying to figure out how to make a living just from woodturning, or
- Anyone wanting to see woodturning become a fine art or who wants to see their own woodturning become something purchased as art.
